The league further indicated that, while regrettable following Muhlenberg's competitive season, the team made an honorable and correct decision ahead of the playoffs.

The Stallions were forced to make this decision due to player departures over the last three weeks. Multiple players have left due to injury, recalls to their schools for some activity, or other personal reasons. The combination of these departures in such a short time created an untenable situation, especially the on remaining pitchers.







Conservation districts are a valuable resource to landowners who face the challenges posed by natural resource use & management. The Muhlenberg County Conservation District was organized on July 16, 1946. The district is a subdivision of state government, and is governed by a 7-member board of supervisors. The mission of the conservation district is to provide leadership in conservation, and to administer programs to help land users conserve; improve; and sustain natural resources and the envrionment.

The District relies on partnerships with many organizations and agencies to accomplish its goals. These organizations/agencies include the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), the Farm Service Agency (FSA), the Muhlenberg County University of Kentucky Extension Service, the Kentucky Division of Conservation, the Pennyrile Resource Conservation and Development Council (RC&D), the Muhlenberg County Fiscal Court, City of Greenville and City of Central City.

Priorities for the District include:

•Working with watershed conservancy districts to promote maintenance of structures and channels. •Sponsorship of students to attend 4H Camp, Forestry Camp and Conservation Camp.

•Sponsorship of Muhlenberg County High School Soil Judging Team.

•Annual Take a Kid Fishing Event 2nd Saturday in June.

Annual Art & Writing Contest every fall.

Annual Tree Day in April - 1000 free tree seedlings given away.

•Sponsorship of the KACD Auxiliary Scholarship Program.

•Farm Bill Legislation - Programs such as Cropland Reserve Program (CRP), Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP), State Cost Share (SCS), Agriculture Water Quality Program (AWQ) and conservation planning.

•Other items as detailed in the District's Annual Plan of Work.

During the 2021 fiscal year, Muhlenberg County NRCS office accepted 31 new applications for the Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP). 14 of these applications were approved. Muhlenberg County received \$165,276 for the approved practices. The contracts include practices for seasonal high tunnels, cover crop, pasture renovation, and conservation cover.



Soil Testing Voucher Program.

During the 2020 calendar year, the Muhlenberg County Conservation District paid for 268 soil tests for landowners. Landowners can receive up to 40 soil testing vouchers per calendar year.

In 2020, the District partnered with the Muhlenberg County Fiscal Court to provide Muhlenberg County residents a drop off location for recycling fluorescent bulbs. County residents can drop off bulbs at the solid waste dump site on Dean Road in Greenville. Recycling equipment and services were provided for this program through the Environmental Grant Program with Kentucky Division of Conservation.

Due to COVID-19, many of the Conservation District's activities were cancelled in the spring. We were unable to hold our annual awards banquet in March. However, our local elementary schools continued their participation in the Annual Jim Claypool Conservation Art Contest. The following students received awards for their participation.
